Data Quality across the BOS has been an "A" for the past several months. Going into a second round of supplies delivery such as PPE and Sanitation. Orders for round 2 have been received; deliveries should start in the next few weeks.

Food boxes have doubled and moved to a drive-thru- there has been an increase in foodstuffs to offset the need. Little Colorado and Change Point aren't able to do an in-person meeting- beginning to work on case conferencing by phone. Taking all SPDATS by phone. Folks are having difficulty finding a unit to lease. The search time has expanded. Cochise—COVID-19 response has been leveling off. There have been no cases in either shelter. No LCEH meeting since March, but is scheduled next week to get back on track. The City of Sierra Vista has identified ending homelessness in their strategic plan. There are affordable housing issues in Sierra Vista—there is a gap in behavioral health, specifically related to psychiatric care. The Gaps Analysis helped to identify issues and due to outreach during the analysis, an additional 10-15 people have expressed interest in joining the local LCEH. Plan to meet with Workforce Development Board to develop the MOU. CE and Case Conferencing have continued. Coconino—It is difficult to keep up with all the issues. The LCEH is adapting to the needs as they occur. Flagstaff Shelter Services has been outstanding in responding to the need. Additional resources have been critical to the response. Avenues of communication have stayed open. Case Conferencing has continued. Several landlords have significantly increased rents. Landlords are very short with tenant resolutions with minor tenant issues. Gila—Jake Gardner's contract expired at the end of June- no replacement yet. Didn't have a meeting in July but will be on at end of August. Distributing masks, sunscreen, hand sanitizers,
