What is the Continuum of Care(CoC)?

- ▶ Per 24 CFR §578.5, the Continuum of Care is formed to align with U.S Department of Housing and Urban Developments requirements related to funds for housing for persons experiencing homelessness. There are approximately 400+ continuum throughout the United States
 - ▶ Responsible for planning and implementing strategies to end homeless in their geographic area.
 - ▶ Decisions made through Governance Advisory Board which establishes policy and provides guidance for how the CoC operates.
 - ▶ Composed of members that include agencies with HUD-CoC funded projects, ESG funded projects, emergency shelters and shelters serving survivors of domestic violence, businesses, veteran groups, faith-based organizations, physical and behavioral health organizations, law enforcement, first responders, those with lived experience, and other stakeholders.

What Does the CoC Do (24 CFR §578.7)?


- ▶ Implement strategies to end homelessness in geographic areas of the CoC.
- Develop policies that align with HUD requirements and ensure implementation.
- ▶ Implement Coordinated Entry and Case Conferencing—the processes used to engage individuals in the CoC, identify the resources they need and complete housing placement with ongoing case management as needed.
- Conduct an annual Point in Time Count that include persons unsheltered and sheltered.
- Apply for funding through HUD's annual CoC Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)
- ▶ Ensure that all data that is needed and required is collected through a data management system (HMIS).

Arizona CoCs

The **Arizona Balance of State Continuum of Care** (**AZBOSCOC**) is one of three Arizona continuums — **Maricopa** County and **Pima** County being the other two.

AZBOSCOC is comprised of the 13 counties outside of Pima and Maricopa. (Apache, Cochise, Coconino, Gila, Greenlee, Graham, La Paz, Mohave, Navajo, Pinal, Santa Cruz, Yavapai and Yuma.)

- Six AZBOSCOC Counties are designated as rural by HUD (Apache, Navajo, Gila, Greenlee, Graham and La Paz).
- Covers 84% of Arizona geography and 24% of state population.



Organization of the AZBOSCOC

- ► The Arizona Department of Housing (ADOH) is the United Funding Agency/Collaborative Applicant for the HUD annual NOFO application.
- ▶ The Arizona Department of Housing is also the recipient for all the funds received for housing projects located in the AZBOSCOC. In 2024—there are 16 projects approved for a total of \$5.4 million. Units from these projects provide housing opportunities in all 13 counties in the AZBOSCOC, administration, and data management. (In addition to housing projects, funding was also awarded for UFA, planning, and HMIS.)
- ▶ The AZBOSCOC conducts its policy and operations activities through the Governance Advisory Board, and Committees including—HMIS, Veterans, Coordinated Entry, Point in Time (ad hoc), Justice/Equity/Diversity/Inclusion, and others that will facilitate policy and operations along with the Local Continuums/Coalitions to End Homelessness.
- ► The AZBOSCOC established Local Coalitions/Continuums to End Homelessness (LCEH) that cover all 13 AZBOSCOC counties. LCEHs coordinate local services and implement AZBOSCOC strategies including service delivery, coordinated entry, local planning, and gaps analysis. Potential new applicants are encouraged to contact LCEH(s) in potential service area to identify needs and coordination opportunities.

AZBOSCOC -What is funded from CoC HUD funds

- ▶ Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)—rental assistance/leasing of units designated for persons experiencing homelessness with a disability. Households that meet the definition of chronically homeless are the priority for PSH projects. They do not have an occupancy time limit. Projects must make supportive services available.
- ▶ Rapid Rehousing—units designed to move individuals and families out of homelessness quickly by providing a rental subsidy and case management. Rental units in the community are used so the household can take over rent responsibilities once they have regained self-sufficiency. Dedicated bonus project funding also funds RRH programs focused on households that are fleeing domestic violence.
- ➤ TH-RRH-The AZBOSCOC has one TH-RRH project that includes both transitional housing and rapid rehousing
- ▶ Supportive Services in alignment with PSH and RRH
- HMIS
- Planning
- Administrative
- Indirect

Notice of Funding Opportunity 2024

- ▶ HUD published the 2024 NOFO, making \$3.5 billion for the Continuum of Care Program (CoC) competitive funding available nationally.
- ▶ AZBOSCOC will conditionally allocate up to approximately \$7.2 million through the Continuum of Care NOFO process.
- ▶ This amount includes an estimated \$5.4 million in existing renewal grants, approximately \$774,763 for new/bonus project(s), and approximately \$968,454 for new bonus projects that are dedicated to serve survivors of domestic violence. It is a competitive process for all three amounts. Final funding decisions are made by HUD.
- New Bonus projects may only apply for Permanent Housing which includes Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) or Rapid Rehousing (RRH).
- ▶ New Dedicated DV projects may apply for Rapid Rehousing (RRH) or Supportive Services Only for Coordinated Entry.

Eligible Applicants

- ▶ Eligible renewal applicants are those agencies with current AZBOSCOC funded projects with grant expiration dates in calendar year 2025.
- ▶ Eligible applicants for new/bonus project funding including DV bonus funding include non-profits (including faith-based organizations), recognized Tribal Nations, and instrumentalities of state or local government regardless of prior CoC funding.

System Mandates

- ▶ Use of HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) or comparable database for providers that meet the definition of Victim Service Provider
- Participation in LCEH Coordinated Entry/Case Conferencing
- ▶ Ensuring households are connected and receiving supportive services based on need. Generally supportive services are funded through a combination of CoC funds and through use of community resources (health and behavioral health services, employment training, life skills, case management, navigation, etc.)
- ▶ Implementation of Housing First tenets including low barrier approach.
- ▶ Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion exemplified in diversity of staff and governance members, outreach, culturally informed service delivery, operations and policy
- Written Standards and regulatory assurances.
- ▶ Compliance with VAWA regardless of status as a Victim Service Provider.*

^{*}Recipients of DV Bonus Projects can either be non-profit agencies or specific DV agencies as defined by 24 CFR 578.3 which are victim service provider that are a private non-profit organization whose primary mission is to provide services to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking survivors. The term includes rape crisis centers, battered women's shelters, domestic violence transitional housing program and other programs.

Survivors of Domestic Violence

- Survivors of Domestic Violence include:
 - ▶ Recipients of DV Bonus Projects can either be non-profit agencies or specific DV agencies as defined by 24 CFR 578.3 which are victim service providers that are a private non-profit organization whose primary mission is to provide services to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking survivors. The term includes rape crisis centers, battered women's shelters, domestic violence transitional housing program and other programs.
 - ▶ Regardless of whether an agency applies for regular bonus funds or DV bonus funds, if the project is ultimately approved for CoC funding by HUD, it will be required to comply with new VAWA standards that were passed into legislation in 2022.
 - Regardless of whether an agency applies for regular bonus funds or DV bonus funds, the project may include activities referred to as VAWA activities. (See application template.)

Application Review

- ▶ Bonus projects applicants will schedule a time to participate in a brief interview with Bonus Project Review Workgroup(s). Tentative dates for these interviews are 9/30 (afternoon), 10/1, 10/2. Bonus Project Applicants will receive an email about scheduling the 30-minute interview after application is submitted through portal.
- ► CoC and DV Bonus project applications are due September 24th by 5:00 and must be submitted through ADOH Special Needs Portal. Link is in the application template.
