BACKGROUND AND YHDP HISTORY

2016 HUD released Youth Homelessness Demonstration Project

- •Development and implementation of a coordinated community approach that promotes equity for Black, Indigenous, Hispanic (non-white), and LGBTQ+ youth
- •Expanded capacity to develop innovative services and form non-traditional collaborations
- •Centering youth leadership and equitable decision making

Application Process

- •Development of Coordinate Community Plan
- •Receive approval from Youth Action Committee
- •Receive approval from Continuum of Care Board

BACKGROUND AND HISTORY

- YHDP guiding principles developed to align with the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness (2013) core outcomes for youth experiencing homelessness and housing instability
 - Stable Housing
 - Permanent Connections
 - Education & Employment
 - Health & Well-being
- 2019 Tucson/Pima Continuum of Care selected as one of 15 communities receiving an initial investment of \$4.558M





EQUAL DECISION MAKING

- Eight local agencies received funding and technical assistance to launch innovative programs for youth experiencing homelessness using approaches focused on race equity, LGBTQIA+ inclusivity, and youth power.
- A total of 78 new year-round transitional, rapid rehousing, and permanent supportive housing beds were brought online.
 - Crisis transitional housing project centered on LGBTQIA+ youth
- Housing navigation and diversion services help with housing location and implement strategies focused on rapid resolution and host home approaches which subsidize housing costs for young people to reside with fictive kin and other natural supports
- Coordinated Entry process has re-centered experiences more commonly experienced by LGBTQIA+, BIPOC, and non-citizen youth to
 establish a more equitable response and referral process
- Youth Choice Process allows young people to list preferences and needs for housing and supportive services
- Youth/Adult shared leadership across three (3) TPCH committees and community coalitions:
 - Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion Committee
 - Homeless Youth Coalition
 - Youth Action Committee
