



Family Income Growth 1979 - 2007






Between 1979-2007 median family income rose by 35% while income for the top 1% rose by 278 percent.





Corporate Profits As % GDP At Record High - Wages As % GDP At Record Low







169,000 U.S. Jobs Added in August 6 Month Avg. Growth: 160,000/month





Percent Job Losses in Post WWII Recessions




Recover Lost Jobs by Sept. 2014?





U.S. Has Regained 78% of Lost Jobs 1.9 Million Jobs (22%) Still To Recover







Arizona Job Losses Exceeded U.S.




Most Industries Yet to Regain Lost Jobs


Arizona Gained 48,100 Jobs in August (12 Month Increase 2.0% - 25 yr. Average is 3.9%)














(U.S. BLS: Unemployment Rates: Mid Year 2013)








Arizona At Risk For Spending Cuts






Arizona Single Family Permits 2005 - 2014




Arizona Housing Far Below Trend






Annual Percent Change



Arizona Economic Outlook Summary

- 2013 better than most states but
