

2019 Arizona Balance of State Continuum of Care Sheltered & Unsheltered Point in Time Acknowledgements Report

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

Again, this year she coordinated a number of survey improvements including creating our first ever Spanish language survey tool. Ms. Stanton also coordinated shelter surveys with over twenty non-HMIS shelters including domestic violence programs to ensure their data was correctly included in the PIT.

This year we would also like to recognize the team and Crisis Response Network (CRN), the AZBoSCoC Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) System Administrator and the BoS agencies utilizing HMIS. In addition to survey data collected on unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness, the PIT count also includes sheltered data collected from the forty plus shelters, outreach teams and programs utilizing HMIS. CRN worked closely with all BoS HMIS users to ensure data accuracy and to make sure all BoS beds and resources were accurately reported.
