Weatherization Assistance Program Annual State Plan





Increases energy efficiency while ensuring health and safety of household.







- U.S. Department of Energy \$2.3 Million Annual Allocation \$160K possible carryover from PY22.
 - Includes estimate of \$438K for Training & Technical Assistance split with Sub-grantees
 - Anticipate approximately 178 households assisted.
- U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (LIHEAP) Estimate \$4.28 Million (Actual Allocation has yet to be released from DHHS)
 - Anticipate approximately 250 households assisted.
- Southwest Gas Corporation (SWG) \$427K
 - Anticipate approximately 120 households assisted.
- Arizona Public Service (APS) \$3.1M
 - Anticipate approximately 281 households assisted

WAP Annual State Plan

Arizona
Department
of Housing

- Required by Department of Energy (DOE) for distribution of DOE grant funding only.
 - 4 main sections
 - Budget
 - Annual File determines Sub-grantee allocation amounts and numbers of households assisted.
 - Master File determines client eligibility, Program Management, Monitoring and Training and Technical Assistance.
 - Health and Safety Plan
- Annual Plan for LIHEAP is prepared by AzDES
 - In consultation with ADOH
 - Federal funds distributed to AzDES who funds ADOH through an Inter-governmental Agreement
- SWG funding directed by Az Corporation Commission.
 - Allocation has been set at \$427,000 for several years
- APS Funding directed by AZ Corporation Commission.
 - New to ADOH as of January 1, 2023





 Currently 10 Sub-grantee Weatherization Providers awarded by method of distribution that considers service area, populations and poverty statistics.

- Maximum DOE allowable average investment per unit \$8,250
- Priority households are:
 - Elderly (at or above sixty (60) years of age)
 - Persons with disabilities
 - Households with Children at or below the age of 5 years.
 - Households with high energy burden (Low income households who spend 6% or more of their income on energy bills.





- First (1st) Draft plan written in February 23, 2023 for internal WAP Staff review
- Subsequently distributed draft #2 on March 3, 2023 to WAP Technical Committee and WAP Sub-grantees requesting comments and input.
- Draft #3 was distributed to the WAP Policy Advisory Council on March 14, 2023 requesting comments and input.
- Held Policy Advisory Council Meeting March 15, 2023 to discuss plan and receive any recommendations
- Final Draft for public comment was posted to ADOH website on March 21, 2023.
 - Public Comment will be accepted through April 30, 2023.
- Final WAP Annual State Plan is due to DOE by May 1, 2023.

- Addresses goals and objectives identified in the FY2020-FY2024 Consolidated Plan
- Describes methods of distribution for and establishes annual goals and objectives for HUD Community
 Planning and Development resources

FY2023 Annual Action Plan -Formula Resources



- HUD CPD Programs
 - Administered by Arizona Department of Housing
 - Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) \$9,905,563
 - HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) \$6,798,544
 - Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) \$608,782
 - National Housing Trust Fund
 - Administered by Arizona Department of Economic Security
 - Emergency Solutions Grant \$1,766,224

FY2023 Annual Action Plan - NHTF



- Awaiting FY2023 National Housing Trust Fund Allocation
 - Expected funding approximately \$5,766,566
 - Roughly 50% decrease from FY2022
 - Annual Action Plan will be amended to reflect actual allocation
 - Administration 10% and Rental Housing 90%
 - If allocation is higher = proportionate increase
 - If allocation lower = proportionate decrease





- Housing
 - State Housing Trust Fund
 - Section 811 Project Rental Assistance for people with developmental disabilities
 - Low-income Housing Tax Credits federal and state
 - Arizona Industrial Development Authority HOME PLUS mortgage program
 - ▶ Local and Private financing, equity, local donations, in-kind contributions, etc.
- Homelessness
 - Continuum of Care funding
 - ▶ Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing vouchers for rent subsidies to Veterans experiencing homelessness
 - State Housing Trust Fund
 - Arizona Lottery
 - General fund appropriations
- Leverage resources <u>are not</u> included in Annual Action Plan goals and objectives

CDBG Method of Distribution, Funding & Goals



Method of Distribution

- Administration
 - 2% + \$100,000/year and 1% for technical assistance
- 10% Colonias Set Aside
 - Competitive applications
 - Every 2 years combined funding
 - Next NOFA in 2024
- Remaining Funds
 - 85% Noncompetitive Regional Account
 - Based on regional method of distribution
 - Two applications if one is for a public service or planning
 - 15% Competitive State Special Projects
 - Infrastructure & housing
 - \$500,000 maximum

Funding and Goals

- Community Facilities & Improvements
 - 65% \$6.44M
 - 20,000 people (non-housing)
 - 20 households (housing)
 - Demolish 1 building
- Public Services
 - **1**% \$99,056
 - 1,250 people
- Decent Affordable Housing
 - 20% \$1.99M
 - Rehabilitate 12 owner-occupied units

HOME Method of Distribution and Funding Goals



Method of Distribution

- 10% Administration
- 15% CHDO set-aside
 - Rental Housing Development
- Not less than \$2.5M for Owner-occupied Housing Rehabilitation
 - Priority to non-metro areas
- Remaining funds for Rental Housing Development approximately \$2.6 million
 - Focus on new construction
 - Acquisition and/or rehabilitation eligible
- Notice of Funds Availability
 - Stand-alone or LIHTC gap financing
 - May be combined with NHTF, State Housing Trust Fund

- Owner-occupied Housing Rehabilitation
 - 35 units
- Rental Housing
 - Acquisition/Rehabilitation
 - 5 units
 - New Construction
 - 75 units





Method of Distribution

- 10% Administration
- 90% for New Construction of Rental Housing
 - Extremely low-income households

- Notice of Funds Availability
 - Stand-alone or LIHTC gap financing
 - May be combined with HOME, State Housing Trust Fund

- Rental Housing Construction
 - 25 units

HOPWA Method of Distribution and Funding Goals



Method of Distribution

- 3% ADOH Administration
- Up to 7% Project Sponsor Administration
 - Project Sponsors reviewed annually
- Remaining funds for housing and services for people with HIV/AIDS and their families

- Essential Services, Permanent Housing Placement & Housing Information Services
 - 50 people
- Short-term Rent, Mortgage & Utility Assistance
 - 50 households
- Tenant Based Rental Assistance
 - 25 households

ESG Method of Distribution and Funding Goals



Method of Distribution

- 7.5% Administration
- Remaining funds for shelter and services
- Intergovernmental Agreements or Competitive Request for Proposals
 - Combined with other homelessness funding
 - Grantees must participate in a Continuum of Care

- Street Outreach & Services
 - 600 people
- Rapid Rehousing
 - 400 households
- Homelessness Prevention
 - 150 households
- Shelter Operating
 - 6,000 people
- Shelter Improvements & Development
 - 20 shelter beds added

Recovery Housing Program (RHP) Plan Substantial Amendment

For FY2022 and FY2023 Funding





- Under the CDBG program umbrella
 - Occupants must be primarily low-income (less than 50% AMI)
 - Presumed benefit
 - People living in poverty, AHCCCS eligible/enrolled and other CDBG presumed benefit populations
 - Cross-cutting regulations
- Recovery Housing Definition
 - Voluntary
 - Safe
 - Substance-free
 - Temporary up to 24 months
 - Wrap-around services on-site or with local providers
 - Not less than 4 beds
 - Non-congregate shelter facilities or individual rental units





- 1. Is abstaining from use of alcohol, illicit drugs, and non-prescribed medications, and making informed healthy choices that support physical and emotional well-being.
- 2. Has a stable and safe place to live (with RHP assistance).
- 3. Is engaging in meaningful daily activities, such as a job, school, volunteerism, family caretaking, or creative endeavors.
- 4. Is working towards independence, and securing the income and resources necessary to participate in society.
- 5. Is engaging in relationships and social networks that provide support.





- Includes FY2022 (\$917,922) and FY2023 (\$1,174,274)
 - **\$2,092,196** Total
 - ADOH technical assistance 3%
 - ADOH administration 5%
- Notice of Funds Available
 - Grants for new construction, acquisition and/or rehabilitation of housing or facilities
 - Goal: serve 8 individuals in recovery with 8 individuals annually exiting to permanent housing
 - Priority to non-metro counties with age-adjusted drug overdose mortality rates higher than statewide average
 - La Paz, Gila, Yavapai, Mohave, Cochise, Graham

HOME-ARP Allocation Plan Substantial Amendment

Part of FY2021 Annual Action Plan



ADOH HOME-ARP Qualifying Populations Overview

- Homeless per CoC and ESG definition, regardless of income
 - Except fleeing or attempting to flee violence
- At risk of homelessness per CoC definition
- Fleeing or attempting to flee
 - Domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, sex/labor trafficking
- Previously homeless, now temporarily housed, and without additional assistance will become homeless again
- Household income < 30% AMI and paying 50% or more of income for housing





- Adds a preference for individuals and families experiencing homelessness in all HOME-ARP activities
 - Non-congregate Shelter
 - Rental Housing
 - Supportive Services
- Establishes order in which individuals and families are admitted to or selected for occupancy by subrecipients, service providers and owner/developers
 - Does not change eligible beneficiaries
 - Does not exclude individuals and families from other qualifying populations from applying for shelter, housing or supportive services
